

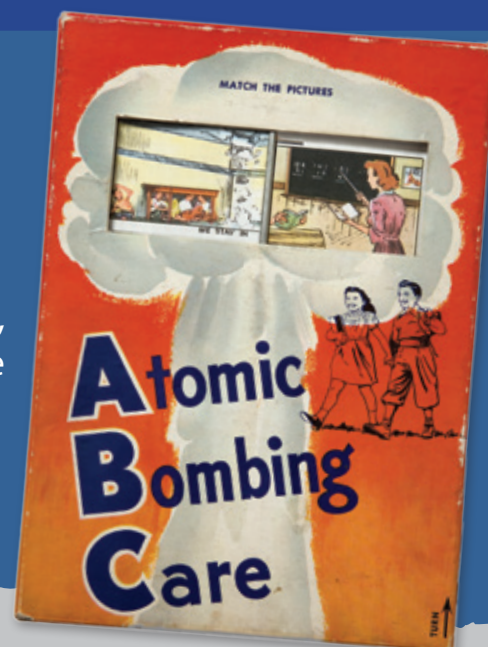

FINDING SHELTER IN THE ATOMIC AGE: DISCUSSION BY STEVE SPILLER

Thursday, June 25, 2015 (6:00 PM to 7:30 PM) *Reservations required.*

The father of Steve Spiller's childhood companion built a fallout shelter to protect his family. This was a time when the neighborhood was full of young couples with "baby boom" children. Inspired in graduate school by this fading memory, Spiller researched 20 years of Riverside's Press-Enterprise newspaper. It was clear that Southern California's Inland Empire was a likely target of Eastern European nuclear warheads, fueling the nightmarish fears of nuclear annihilation.

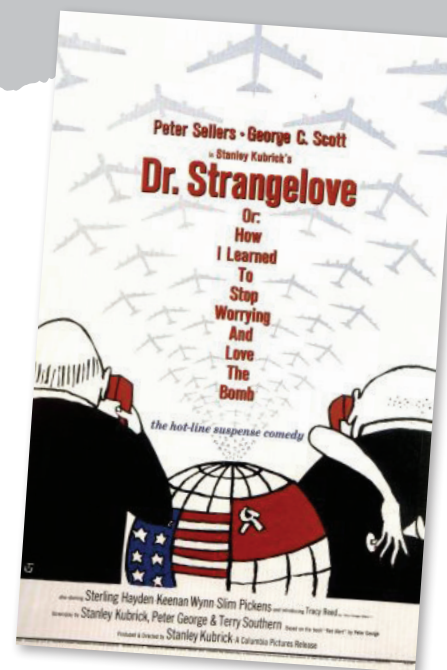
